The material is divided roughly into three major sections: ancient cultures through the fall of Rome, the development of Medieval Christendom, and emergence of early modern states and societies. We will examine some of the political structures, ideas, religions, events, movements, social and economic developments, and personalities that have shaped western culture and identity.

It will include an examination of the following topics: Inca, Maya, and Aztec Civilizations, the European conquest, the growth and consolidation of the Spanish and Portuguese colonies, race and slavery, regional unrest and revolt, the Bourbon Reforms, the independence movements, the emergence of the Latin American republics, the advent of liberalism, revolution, state economies, U.S.-Latin American politics, criminality and violence, the role of popular and official religion, indigenous movements, the construction of race and identity, and globalization. The principle underlying themes will be the issue of power, race thinking, and modernity.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course is the second half of the American history survey series, covering the period from the end of Reconstruction to the end of the Cold War. This nation's history has unfolded through a variety of events, ideas, and people over the course of this 110-year period. In order to survey these changes we will explore several themes, including: The growth and centralization of the federal government and its role in American economics and society; America's foreign policy and its role in the world; the interaction between people of different races, ethnicities, classes, genders and religions and the impact this has had on American politics and society; and the impact of industrialization and commercialization on the lives of ordinary Americans and the development of American popular culture. We will engage content through assigned readings, lectures, and in-class multimedia presentations, and this course will stress thoughtful reading and reflection, analytical writing, occasional collaborative work, and in-class discussion.

G. Bissinger, Friday Night Lights: A Town, a Team, and a Dream, (2000 [1990]).

COURSE DESCRIPTION: A general overview of the economic, political, social, and cultural development of the United States from sixteenth century through the Civil War and Reconstruction. The following topics will be studied: the European settlement of North America and the encounter between Europeans and Native Americans; the development and decline of Puritan society and culture in New England; the development of diverse colonial economies, polities, and societies in the context of the British Empire in the eighteenth century; the political process of protest, resistance, and revolution of the colonies from England and the founding of the United States; the development of the American political system and culture and society between 1780 and 1820; the impact of the commercial, agricultural, and industrial revolutions of the early nineteenth century on American life; the rise and social, cultural, and political impact of a reform-minded urban middle class in the North; the development and entrenchment of a slaveholding, capitalist system in the South; the expansion of the American nation and society to the West; the social, cultural, and political polarization between the North and South which led to Civil War; and the Civil War and Reconstruction. Course grade will be based on two exams and three short essays.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This is primarily a lecture course designed to give the college student a basic understanding of American history since the Civil War. The lectures will focus on providing a general chronology of events, issues, and personalities from a political as well as cultural standpoint. The readings will serve to supplement the lectures and the student will be expected to synthesize these components of the course and provide feedback to the instructor in the form of quizzes, exams, and a writing assignment.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: A general overview of the American Revolution from the development of the political crisis in the British colonies of North America in the mid-eighteenth century to outbreak of the political and military revolution that resulted in the creation of the new nation of the United States of America. The political developments that led to the writing and implementation of the United States Constitution between 1787 and 1789, and its subsequent impact on American politics through 1800 will also be analyzed. Political and military events will be examined within the context of the economic, social, and cultural transformation of the Anglo-American Atlantic world. Course grades will be based on one exam, three quizzes, and three short papers.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Spanning ten states and three provinces, the Great Plains is a unique geographical area known most for its wide-open spaces, grasslands, and agricultural abundance. Interestingly, demographic growth is hampered both by real climatic issues and by errant assumptions -- the region was called "The Great American Desert" in the nineteenth century and was largely considered a "fly-over zone" by nonresidents in the twentieth century. Despite low population densities and a less than favorable media position, the region has long hosted an amazing array of diverse cultures. This course will thematically examine the cultural, social, geographical, economic, and political complexities of the region. It surveys the history of the entire Great Plains but pays special attention to the state of Nebraska.
